"I always went back to drugs..."

C edric spent years addicted to drugs, and they took a huge toll on his health and his family. "I wasn't eating, staying in old abandoned cars, doing anything to get my next high. I wasn't there for my kids," he says. "Every chance I got, I just wanted to stay out and get high."

He knew he needed help and so, he decided to go to rehab. But rehab didn't fix the hurt and pain inside him. "I always stayed



clean for six months. But I always went back to drugs."

Cedric wasn't sure where to go until – at his mom's suggestion – he got down on his knees and prayed. When he did, Cedric felt God strongly leading him to Hiway 80 Rescue Mission. Within a few days, he was on our doorstep and joined our long-term New Creation recovery program.

Even though his mom was a minister, and he'd grown up in church, Cedric never had a relationship with God. But as he went through classes, Bible study and Christian counseling in our program, he discovered God's unconditional love. **"The Mission** gave me a chance to wake up and see that there was a better side to life than drugs."

After graduating, Cedric took part in our Leadership Training Program, where he continued his spiritual growth while supporting both our staff and new program residents. "It's important to have someone to look up to, who you can talk to, who tells you that God will listen and help you through... because they've been there."

Today, Cedric has a job working at an assisted living facility here in town. "Everything I learned at the Mission is what I'm doing in my job," he says gratefully. He's also saving up money to get his own place. "I have always wanted my own place so my kids can say, 'I'm going to stay with Dad.""

Cedric still visits the Mission on a regular basis. "It helps me remember that I do have a support system."

He's grateful for the opportunity the Mission's given him to completely transform his life. "**It's more than a meal and a place to stay.** If you need help, there's always someone here who will help you."

eigha grew up in a world split between church and drugs. "Whenever my parents weren't using [drugs], we'd go to church," she says.

The rest of the time, her parents' addictions reigned in her home, their responsibilities for their seven children falling on their eldest daughter's shoulders.

"I wasn't really involved in school because I had to be home and take care of my brothers and sisters," Leigha says. "I made sure that they got their homework done. I made sure my mom and dad ate. I would cook food and wake them up to eat. I would be the one that had to discipline my brothers and sisters. **I had to grow up really fast.**"

Leigha was 15 when, at her stepmother's bidding, she used drugs for the first time. Before long, her entire world revolved around substance abuse. "Everywhere I went there were drugs," she says. "My father was murdered three years ago from a drug deal."

Eventually, Leigha found herself addicted and homeless, with two children to care for. It was then that Child Protective Services stepped in, putting her two daughters in foster care, and bringing Leigha to Hiway 80 Rescue Mission.

She was still reeling when she arrived, but the staff was quick to comfort her. **"They said, 'Everything is going to be okay...you can do this,"** she says, **"and they were right."**

With the help of her caseworker, Leigha has faithfully attended



outpatient rehab and complied with CPS requirements necessary to be reunited with her daughters.

Best of all, she has rededicated her life to the Lord. "God had to really do something to bring His child back to Him, and He did," Leigha says. "I am in the light...I feel like I am actually who God wanted me to be in the first place."

When Leigha graduates from rehab, she intends to look for work, find an apartment she can eventually share with her daughters, and continue attending services and recovery meetings at the church she now calls home. "I am really dedicated to keeping my life straight. I don't ever plan on using again," Leigha says.

"The Mission is my safe haven where I got away from all the drugs," she adds. "They are the 'clean' family I never had. I've finally found a place I could call home." Like us
